

My dear friends,

This year, we celebrate the 10th Anniversary of the Haiti Micah Project. God has truly blessed us with faith in action. The last decade has presented us with challenges none of us could have foreseen. In 2005, we started in response to an increasing number of orphaned, abandoned and neglected children in Mirebalais by providing relief and sustenance to less than a hundred children. The earthquake in 2010 swelled our numbers as refugees flooded into Mirebalais. Today, we are serving over 400 children with a daily meal, educational assistance, health care and spiritual support. Our orphanage provides a loving home for 27 children who were rescued from the cycle of poverty.

Our work continues. By summer, we expect to open our vocational training center made possible by your prayers and donations. Upon completion, we will hopefully be able to provide training opportunities to young adults in computers, sewing, and other skills. In the short term, construction



has provided many temporary jobs in the community which meets another important element of our successful strategy of working through Haitians to help Haitians.

In another important development, we are taking our first steps toward the construction of a new permanent orphanage with an expanded capacity. The City of Mirebalais has donated approximately six acres of land for that purpose and we are already fencing the area and doing preliminary planning. We are grateful to the City for its support in our efforts. Fundraising for our new orphanage will be one of our greatest challenges and opportunities in the near future.

The Haiti Micah Project takes its name and mandate from Chapter 6 of the Book of Micah to "do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with God." Justice for the children of Haiti means not only basic food and shelter, but an opportunity for personal and spiritual development as contributing members of a democratic society. Guided by the Holy Spirit and with the support of our many contributors, we will strive to continue to bring kindness and justice to Haitian children. It is a blessing to know that we are changing the lives of God's children in Haiti. Your time and generosity have made so many victories possible.

# The Haiti Micah Project in 2014



The Haiti Micah Project (HMP) is a Christian organization committed to addressing the needs of impoverished and uneducated children in Haiti, often referred to as street children. The HMP is a non-profit corporation under the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia and it has a Haitian counterpart, "Solidarite et Action pour Les Enfants de Sion" (SAES). Working with and through our Haitian counterparts, the HMP responds to the social challenges affecting street children identified by community leaders in Mirebalais, Haiti, a city located in the Central Plateau.

The HMP provides multiple services to the street children of Mirebalais. We operate a small orphanage caring for 27 children (there are more children on occasion, due to special circumstances). Many of these children were rescued from wretched slum conditions and are now provided with shelter, food and educational opportunities. Most importantly, they are given the love of caregivers. For many, it is the only stable home life they have known.

HMP operates a daily meal program providing a hot and nutritious meal to several hundred children. Our meal program in the community has grown exponentially from an original 150 in 2009 to over 400 meals served in 2014. For many of these children, the meal is the only nutrition they receive that day. For children in the meal program, HMP also provides access to education in the several private schools in Mirebalais. There is no free public education in Mirebalais, and HMP helps cover the costs of tuition, school supplies and uniforms.

HMP also provides the children access to a health clinic. In response to the outbreak of cholera in 2011, the HMP funded the digging of a water well and purification facilities which now provides clean safe drinking water for the children we serve as well as the immediate neighborhood. Our locally employed and fully trained operational manager ensures safe water for the community.

Immediate plans call for the construction and running of a vocational training center to provide skills training for older children. Construction has begun and fund raising is ongoing. Future plans include the construction of a larger orphanage, thereby freeing



us from the present rented facilities and allowing us to serve more children. Initial architectural plans have been completed for the new orphanage.

All these activities are supported by voluntary donations, mainly through our Sponsor-a-Child Program. For \$300 a year, a sponsor can participate in the Program. Child sponsorships grew to over

270 this year and several new community-based events provided shoes, school supplies, and over the counter medicines. Additional funding comes from institutional support, mainly churches, and from foundation grants.

Administratively, the HMP is staffed solely by volunteers in the United States. HMP provides funds to SAES in Mirebalais which, in turn, hires local Haitians to staff the orphanage and the water treatment facility, and the cooks for the meal program. Our strong volunteer culture and organization have been recognized through awards like "Great NonProfits for 2014," as well as designation of Gold status (the highest level) by Guidestar, a non-profit rating organization.

# Accomplishments and events in 2014 include:

- An upgrade to our website (http://haiti-micah.org), adding a donation link and making a much more user friendly site with improved messaging.
- Fast Trak Racing event on July 4th, involving 200 sponsored racers around Great Falls Park. Proceeds paid for 10,000 acetaminophen tablets to care for Haitians suffering from the Chikungunya virus in the Mirebalais community. Also as part of the event, specially made Frisbees with the HMP logo were created and will be shipped for the children in HMP.
- An elementary school in Alexandria ran a shoe-drive as part of a community outreach effort and collected shoes that were shipped to Mirebalais for the start of school in August 2014.
- Thanks to the creativity and generosity of Fisk United Methodist Church in Natick, Massachusetts, little girls at the Haiti Micah Project are wearing

beautiful new dresses made by a sewing and knitting group.

- Foundation support was received for the construction of the vocational school (photo to the right)
- Institutional support includes 30 churches and organizations throughout the nation (see back cover).
- This year HMP passed its fourth annual audit, (2010-2013). We were recognized by Guidestar, a database of over 2 million IRS approved nonprofits, at its highest Gold level and rated a 2014 Top Non Profit by volunteers and donors.
- St. Mary of the Woods Catholic School, in Milton, MA held their third annual Run to Benefit Haiti Micah Project. This event is organized by students, under the direction of school staff, and in conjunction with the city government of Milton.







#### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Board of Directors Haiti Micah Project, Inc. Alexandria, Virginia

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Haiti Micah Project, Inc. (a non-profit organization) which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2013 and 2012 and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

## Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

# NATURE OF ENTITY AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

# Nature of Entity

Haiti Micah Project, Inc. (the "Project") is a not-for-profit corporation established to support mission activities in Haiti, including the development of services and programs to serve Haiti's impoverished children. Haiti Micah Project, Inc. began its mission work in October 2006. The project currently operates a 28 bed home and operates a feeding and education program which helps up to 500 children.

# Significant Accounting Policies

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Due to their prospective nature, actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### **Basis of Accounting**

The Project recognizes assets and liabilities and revenues and expenses on the accrual basis of accounting.

#### Investments

Investments are composed of certificates of deposit with maturities of greater than three months. The investments are stated at fair market value.

# **Recognition of Donor Restrictions**

Support that is restricted by the donor is reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets if the restriction expires in the reporting period in which the support is recognized. All other donor-restricted support is reported as an increase in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restriction. When a restriction expires, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

# **Property and Equipment**

Property and equipment is stated at historical cost or fair market value at the date of contribution. The Project has adopted a capitalization policy of \$500. Property and equipment is being depreciated using the straight-line method over the useful life. Useful lives are five to seven years for furniture, fixtures and vehicles.

# 1. NATURE OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued):

#### **Financial Statement Presentation**

Under financial accounting standards, the Project is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets.

#### Contributions

Contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence or nature of any donor restrictions. Unconditional promises to give are recognized as revenue and receivables in the period received. Promises to give that are due in future years are reported as temporarily restricted contributions and are released from the time restriction in the period they are collected.

The Organization writes off uncollectible pledges and contributions receivable when they are deemed uncollectible.

# **Donated Property and Equipment**

Donations of property and equipment are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair value at the date of donation. Such donations are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets unless the donor has restricted the donated asset to a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use and contributions of cash that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted contributions.

# **Donated Materials and Services**

Donations of services that require specialized skills are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair value at the date of donation. Such donations are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets and as expenses in the period received. Donations of food, supplies and other items are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair value at the date of donation. Donated services and supplies that were provided to the Project during the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012 had a recorded value of \$23,769 and \$29,812, respectively.

# **Functional Expenses**

Expenses are charged to programs, management and general, and fundraising under an allocation plan management deems reasonable and appropriate. Management and general expenses include those expenses that are not directly identifiable with any other specific function but provide the overall support and direction of the Project.

# **Advertising Costs**

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred.

# **Cash Flows**

For purposes of reporting the statement of cash flows, the Project includes all cash accounts, which are not subject to withdrawal restrictions or penalties, and all highly liquid investments purchased with an initial maturity of three months or less as cash and cash equivalents on the accompanying statement of financial position.

#### 2. INCOME TAX STATUS

Haiti Micah Project, Inc., is exempt from Federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and is not considered a private foundation.

# 3. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

At December 31, 2013 and 2012, cash consists of deposits in a checking account.

# 4. CONTRIBUTIONS RECEIVABLE

Contributions receivable represent unconditional promises to give that will be collected in future years.
